

The International University College of Turin (IUC) was established in 2006 for the interdisciplinary and comparative study of law, economics and finance, in response to the lack of a transnational set of normative principles capable of controlling economic processes. The IUC actively fosters a research-based agenda, seeking innovative collaboration by a diverse community of scholars and practitioners. A number of renown intellectuals and scholars from around the world currently serve on the faculty and governance of the College including: Guido Calabresi (former Dean of the Yale School of Law), Ugo Mattei (Universities of Torino & California-Hastings), Josef Halevi (Sydney), Duncan Kennedy (Harvard Law School), Stefano Rodotà (co-author of the European Charter of Fundamental Rights), Günter Frankenberg (Frankfurt), Jan Toporowski (SOAS London), Talha Syed (California-Berkely), and Avi Singh (New Delhi). The IUC President is Roberto Louvin.

Master of Research in Food, Law, and Finance



The M.Res. in Food, Law and Finance is a joint postgraduate research program to inspire an eco-legal food advocacy marked by the signature pluralism and inter-disciplinarity of the IUC approach, and by the Pollenzo University of Gastronomic Sciences' long-standing concern for sustainable access to quality food.

The M.Res. curriculum triangulates law and finance with a solid understanding of the processes underpinning the provision of food, to unveil the tensions and tradeoffs of the global production regime.

The program also cultivates a pronounced sensitivity to the ecological dimension: interrogating the global food regime equipped with the institutional inventiveness afforded by an expanded eco-legal literacy, and with the visions of ecological transition made possible by generative financial architectures.

Deconstructive and critical perspectives interact in the curriculum with a pro-active style of professional practice and active citizenship, to enliven the work of policy practitioners and researchers, and the strategies of civil society organization.

Curriculum of Studies

The M.Res. program has a duration of 18 months, and awards a total of 90 ECTS. The fee for the whole program is 16,000 euros.

Students complete an intensive taught component during the first three terms attending foundational courses, and a choice of elective modules.

After completion of the taught component, students join the IUC Research community: their contributions to scholarly and policy debate are highly encouraged through the IUC's own resources, or on other venues for public debate.

The IUC Research environment offers a supportive context for the students' self-driven research work: through mentorship, regular faculty seminars and a growing range of institutional partners.

To complete the program, students produce an M.Res. thesis, which may be in written or audio-visual form.
